Developing a Regional Learning Collaborative

Purpose

- Make the best use of your time
- Increase participation
- Deliver meaningful content
- Collaborative planning

Benefits

- Targeted content
- Build community capacity
- Networking for cross-project stakeholders
- Reduce silos
- One shared learning community

Structure

- Every other month
- Half-day, 3-4 hours with a networking lunch
 - Centered on regional data
 - Shared learning or training, guest speakers, small group breakouts
 - Content targeted to regional partners, events open to all
- Focus on peer learning
- Include resource/sharing table and events calendar
- Fold in the Hub Advisory Committee

Help Me Grow: Program Update

Help Me Grow

Core Components

1

Child health care provider outreach to support early detection and intervention.

2

Community outreach to promote use of Help Me Grow and to provide networking opportunities among families and service providers.

3

Centralized telephone access point for connecting children and their families to services and care coordination.

4

Data collection to understand all aspects of the Help Me Grow system, including the identification of gaps and barriers.

Partner Presentation: Youth and Family Link



Link's Mission:

To promote positive change in a child and family's life by engaging and linking them to resources that will result in success in school, having positive friends, a healthy home life and being involved in positive activities.



Link to Child Wellness Serves:

- Drug-affected pregnant women
- Pregnant women in need of services
 - Children birth – 18 years

Family is always a part of services



Referral Sources

- Medical clinics/hospital
- Schools
- Family members or friends
- Juvenile court
- CPS
- Self



Requesting Services

Clinic Referrals:

1. Call clinic referral number
2. A Community Health Worker will respond within one hour to the clinic

Community, Self, and Agency Referrals:

1. Call (360) 423-6741
2. A Community Health Worker will reach out within 24 hours



Link to Child Wellness

- Work with mother, child, and others in the community
- Reach out to help overcome barriers
- Link families to services and resources
- Ensure services are available, accessible, and continue to be used



Link to Child Wellness

- Help achieve four main goals
 - Insurance
 - Primary care physician
 - Well child checks
 - Dental exam
- Help overcome barriers
 - Transportation
 - Community information
 - Housing
 - Food
 - School barriers
 - Employment



Outcomes

- In 2018, 377 families were referred; we engaged and served 370 of those families.
- 100% of engaged families participated in proactive healthcare and healthy family activities.
- The average length of time a family is served: 3.2 months



Outcomes

Referrals of Drug-Affected Women:

89% engaged

75% of actively using mothers entered treatment

Referrals for Basic Needs:

Facilitated access to 342 healthcare appointments

Facilitated access to 321 positive activities

Facilitated access to housing resources 188 times

Facilitated access to food 165 times

Facilitated access to clothing 131 times

Facilitated access to transportation 394 times

Facilitated access to school or work 12 times

Perinatal Mental Health: Community Meeting and Forum
